A Brief Report

Security is a term of stress reliever in insecure life. Food, being the first most important need of human life, needs to be taken care of by everyone in the changing scenario of environmental, political and technical conditions associated with overpopulation and increasing rate of mortality with improved medical knowledge and facilities.

Food security means availability, accessibility and affordability of food to all people at all times. But ensuring food security ought to be an issue of great importance for a country like India- where more than one third of the population is estimated to be absolutely poor and one-half of all children malnourished in one way or other. Food availability is a necessary condition for food security. At present, providing food security to all insecure people became the prime responsibility of the Central, State and Local governments of all the countries.

Conducting this seminar humbly aims at focusing a deep look into various issues related to Government policies and different challenges associated with successful implementation in providing food security to all the needy Indians. Different ideas presented at the Seminar thus, helps to improve the knowledge and ideas of all the participants and especially, of the students- the future makers of India's role on the path of development.

The question of food security has a number of dimensions that extend beyond the production, availability, and demand for food. There has been a paradigmatic shift in the concept of food security, from food availability and stability to household food insecurity, and from assessment of input measures to output indicators and clinical signs of malnutrition.

The seminar paved a convenient stage to exchange the ideas and encouraged the participation of not only the teachers and researchers but also young students from rural areas in understanding the concept and clarifying their doubts.

Basic issues related to food security are:

- ii) Establishment of WTO: particularly the agreement on Agriculture (AoA) under it:

- iii) Challenges of Climatic change: crisis of the three F's viz., food prices, fuel prices, and financial crisis:
- iv) The phenomenon of hunger amidst plenty, i.e., accumulation of stocks in the early years of this decade and in 2008-09 along with high levels of poverty:
- v) Introduction of targeting in the Public Distribution System (PDS) for the first time in the 1990's:
- vi) 'Right to Food' campaign for improving food security in the country and the Supreme Court Orders on mid day meal schemes:
- vii) Proposal for National Food Security Law (Right to Food); and
- viii) Monitorable targets under the Tenth and Eleventh Five Year Plans similar to the Millennium Development goals(MDGs) on poverty and women and child nutrition security of the country.
